Cristian Markos, Cellist

Born into a musical family, Cristian Markos began playing the cello at age eight. He completed his early studies in his native country, Romania, earning a Bachelor degree in Music Performance from the Music Academy of Bucharest. From Romania, Mr. Markos went on to study for one year at the Musik Akademie in Weimar, Germany and toured throughout Europe with the Mont Blanc Youth Symphony Orchestra. Mr. Markos completed his formal studies at the University of Wisconsin Milwaukee studying for two years with Wolfgang Laufer, cellist of the Fine Arts Quartet.

In 1990 Mr. Markos was awarded first prize in Romania's National Cello Competition and went on to win top prizes at other concerto competitions, including the Concord Chamber Orchestra Concerto Competition and the University of Wisconsin Milwaukee Concerto Competition.

An accomplished soloist and chamber musician, Mr. Markos has performed on a variety of stages throughout Romania, France. Germany, Austria, Greece, Italy, the United States, and Canada. He has also spent the past three summers in Boulder, Colorado as a member of the Colorado Music Festival Orchestra.

Since joining the Vancouver Symphony Orchestra in 1999, Mr. Markos has been active in Vancouver's vibrant music community both as a performer and as a teacher. He can be seen often on stage with the CBC Radio Orchestra and collaborates with many of Vancouver's local musicians in concert and recital.

The Vancouver Cello Club continues to maintain The Audrey Piggott Fund, the Catherine Carmack Fund, and the Caroline E. Riley Fund. VCC published three newsletters this season. VCC sponsored two major events this past season; the 7th Banff Cello Fest in February and three master class/workshops and an evening recital with Ottawa cellist, Paul Marleyn. The Caroline E. Riley Competition, adjudicated by Ian Hampton and Cristian Markos was held in May.

Next season's concerts will include a recital in October by Cristian Markos commemorating Cello Club Founder Earnest Collins. Daniel Muller Schott will perform in October with the Vancouver Recital Society and with the VSO next June. In March, the Club hopes

to organize and produce a special "Concert for Slava" - a concert of cello ensemble music commemorating Rostropovich featuring the players of the VSO and Vancouver Opera with the Vancouver Cello Club.

3. The Treasurers Report was read by Dawn Binnington. This year donations amounted to \$4,370, dues were \$1,899.97 and interest was \$1654.80. There were 64 members. The bulk of the spending went to charitable programs such as bursaries and the events held with Ottawa cellist, Paul Marleyn. The remainder went to publishing the newsletter and for bank charges.



Momingside Music Bridge 2007

Momingside Music Bridge takes place at Mount Royal College Conservatory in Calgary, and brings together a selection of passionate young strings and piano students from around the world. This year, there were almost 60 participants - representatives from Canada, the U.S, China, Poland, Japan and Korea - all between the ages of 12 and 18. Music Bridge is an opportunity to meet like-minded young people, and share in the knowledge that the accumulated faculty has to offer. I had the great privilege this summer to attend the program. and have never before worked as hard, learnt as much, or had as much fun as I did in those four weeks!

When people ask me to describe my experience at Music Bridge, the only word I can think of is "intense". I had been warned that the standard would be very high, but I was unprepared for the level of discipline and dedication I saw m my fellow students. The very evening I arrived in Calgary, both my room-mates disappeared into their bedrooms, and practiced a single four octave scale for an hour. The next day, one of the teachers told us that the minimum expectation was four hours of practice a day. I realized then that I better-reform-my practicing-skills!

The first main event we had to prepare for was the concerto competition, which was held four or five days into the program. The competition was mandatory, and the prize was the opportunity to perform with the Calgary Philharmonic Orchestra. Seven semifinalists were selected to play with the orchestra, and four were selected as the winners. After the competition, we turned our attention towards masterclasses.

There were seventeen cellists in all, and each of us played for five fantastic teachers over the course of the month: John Kadz, Na Mu La, Ron Leonard, Desmond Hoebig and Liu Meijuan. We also were very lucky to have Susanne

Ruberg-Gordon supporting us on the piano. Mr. Leonard gave a week of masterclasses where we each played our concerto movement, and he said something new and exciting to each person even after we had heard the first movement of the Haydn D major for the fifth time! Mr. Hoebig heard sonatas, and also made a fantastic impression on all of us with his clearly-stated ideas on both technique and artistry. Throughout the program, we had daily lessons with either Mr. Kadz or Na Mu La, who offered endless amounts of technical advice and enthusiasm. Mr. Kadz's favorite part of Music Bridge (perhaps not an opinion shared by many) was the famed "Popperfest". We each picked two Popper studies out of a hat, and were permitted to choose the third by ourselves. All three were to be performed on the final day. We played 2 of the 3 in a study class with Liu Meijuan about a week before the official "competition", so we had some ideas to work with, but the looming "Popperfest" definitely cast a shadow over the cello class in the last few days!

Amid the flurry of daily lessons and masterclasses, as well as those requisite four hours of daily practice, there was a concert of large chamber ensembles, a chamber music competition, an orchestral piece to prepare, countless faculty concerts and student recitals. We also went on a several outings, including a trip to Lake Louise and a rafting adventure down the Bow River. The month culminated with a gala concert consisting of solo performances, and the string orchestra playing Vaughan Williams' "Fantasia on a theme by Thomas Tallis", which we had prepared in only three rehearsals under the baton of Nick Pulos.

I came back to Vancouver at the beginning of August feeling like a completely different musician to the two-hours-of-practice-a-day cellist who had left a month before. I can still hardly believe the amount of expertise and encouragement that was offered to me, and will always look back at this past summer as a wonderfully exciting, vibrant time of learning and music-making.

Noah James at Domaine Forget

Thanks to the generosity of the Vancouver Cello Club and Domaine Forget, 1 was able to attend the Domaine Forget Strings Program for two weeks in July. Located in Saint-IrÈnÈe, a small town a few hours drive east of Quebec City on the St. Lawrence Seaway, the Domaine Forget properties are large and terraced with beautiful ocean views from almost every building — good for musical inspiration but taking a toll on the arm when carrying an instrument about The cello faculty included Philippe Muller of the Paris Conservatory as masterclass teacher, and Paul Marleyn and Johanne Perron as private teachers. Although I was not chosen to take part in the masterclasses, they were informative to watch. Ample attention was given to students in private lessons, of which students received 3-4 per week with an assigned teacher. Chamber groups were also formed, with coaching sessions almost every day. Most weeknights there were professional concerts accessible to students at the Salle FranAoys-Bernier Concert Hall by such artists and ensembles as James Ehnes, Musica Intima, and the Orchestra de la Francophonie Canadienne, as well as solo and chamber concerts by members of the Domaine Forget faculty. A typical day consisted of a three hour master class, one or two hours of private lessons and/or chamber coaching, voluntary ear training or solfege classes and as much practise as a student desired, capped off by a concert in the evening. I thoroughly enjoyed my stay at Domaine Forget. I learned a lot and would recommend the program to anyone investigating summer music programs.

The Safe Haven of Humanity

and tempered by the amount of fear that circulates around us, but this summer I found a safe haven, a place where people were regaining their humanity through [earning and freedom. I found a place that inspired the youth and regenerated the elderly I found a place of art, a place of learning and a place that gave my love of humanity back to me. This place was Valhalla.

1 will be completely honest, I personally felt that going to Valhalla was not going to be rewarding. I was completely mistaken. The fresh cool blue waters of the Slocan, resting in a valley of green set the background for one of the most renewing, remarkable. rewarding experiences I have ever had. I myself was dubious of the impact a three hours technique class would have

on my life, but the three hours of hard work was a crumb of the cake that is Valhalla. I don't go to Valhalla for the class; I go for the ambience and unique aura that each musician brings to the community of New Denver and Silverton- In a community of 600, all the citizens know each other. This level of community spurns a willingness to connect emotionally, intellectually and artistically with each other. The lack of cell phone reception creates a feeling of isolation. This isolation causes the entire camp to look to each other for companionship and support. The false believe that this music camp is just about music is instantly defeated the first day one arrives at the

camp. The important social aspect of the camp is what is so spectacular.

During the second week of the camp, the instructors prove that freedom is one of the most important words in

a human vocabulary. Instead of forcing us to practice, or occupying huge amounts of our time with technique, master classes and chamber music, the amount we work is completely up to us. This freedom of choice is what makes learning so much more enjoyable. The fact that we choose to be in the class, the fact that we choose to play music with each other and the fact that we choose not to stand idly in the face of musical improvement is a testament to the power of art in humanity This camp is proof that art plays important role for all humans. The fact that even in freedom we will work for music is incredible. The fundamental question we answer at this camp is one that in being asked over and over again in ethics and the world. The



question: can humans ever work together for a common goal, the answer; absolutely, through art, music and other creative outlets for the human soul.

I am glad. For one reason and one reason only that in this world of pain, suffering and hate, there remains a glimmering hope of cooperation and compassion, a bastion of love and learning, a fortress of music and art. The students of Valhalla take for granted the extraordinary challenge they have overcome. They have overcome the contemporary norm of conflict and claimed glorious music as their prize.

9th Banff International String Quartet Competition

The BISQC took place at the Banff Centre August 28 through September 2. For six exhilarating and quite tiring days, nine (the Dutch Quartet could not attend due to the illness of one of their members) of the best young string quartets took centre stage for 13 concerts, playing for a distinguished jury and a very eager and very knowledgeable audience. This was my fifth BISQC and I wouldn't miss this

room (I thought only teenagers had four desserts!). Two of the quartets were old hands – The Zemlinsky Quartet (formerly The Penguin Quartet) from the Czech Republic were on their 3rd time and were rewarded by coming in 2nd. The Tokai String Quartet (Canada) were on their 2nd time and made the finals coming in 4th. The Koryo String Quartet (USA) had a familiar face — cellist Earl Lee when

All quartets had to play Haydn and Bartok (like a mini concert), for the first round; then a Romantic Round, then the Canadian Commission Round – 'Dark Energy' by Kelly-Marie Murphy (lots of exciting rhythms), followed by a Beethoven or
