Cellothon

Hornby Island CELLOTHON moved to Parksville this year. It's two ferries closer to most participants, and we stayed at Beach Acres Resort, staying in clustered cottages. Below us was a magnificent beach, and next door was Rathtrevor Park. Some of us brought partners and grandkids. It was all much more convenient, if not as funky as Hornby is.

The theme this year was SOUND. In his full group session on sound, Martin Bonham, cellist with the Victoria Symphony, demonstrated techniques that invite a cello to open up. He mentioned, of course, bow speed, pressure, distance from the bridge and bow angle, but

the heart of the session was about finding the posture, flowing breath and movement right about the suspension of the right arm and the suspension, flat wrist, a more fist like hold of with limp wrist and long, loose fingers for soft muscles of the back and core, rather than small and easily over used muscles of the asked everybody to find the "rowing" muscles are essential for pressing down the strings thumb. 

became master cellists of the late 20th century. Rose pronated his left hand and pulsed his vibrato toward the bridge with flexible finger joints while Shapiro supported his playing finger with the other three so the whole mass created an intense vibrato. We tried various speeds and widths of vibrato, noticing that some players have easy access to a fast vibrato, others to a slow one while some switch back and forth from one to the other, unable to produce anything in between. Martin explained that, while everybody has an individual vibrato that is a kind of signature, different situations require a range of different vibratos. Some music, for instance, much early music and some modern music, prefers no vibrato at all or only ornamental vibrato. During all the vibrato experimentation, Martin never lost track of sound. He insisted that vibrato should always grow from sound, not the other way around. Vibrato is only an aspect of sound that can enhance resonance but it cannot be separated from sound nor should it overtake the sound. A fat vibrato plastered over a thin sound will always make a peculiar impression. It's all in hearing and understanding what is needed.

For the rest of Cellothon, we played music. There were seven of us, so we broke up into duos and one trio, and then we shuffled and re-dealt players into another configuration. At the end, we performed for each other and the hotel staff. No pressure. Lots of fun. Now, to keep listening to that Sound!!!

Golden Rules For Insemble Playing

- 1. Everyone should play the same piece.
- 2. Stop at every repeat sign and discuss in detail whether to take the repeat or not. The audience will love this a lot!
- 3. If you play a wrong note, give a nasty look to one of your partners.
- 4. Keep your fingering chart handy. You can always catch up with the others.
- 5. Carefully tune your instrument before playing. That way you can play out of tune all night with a clear conscience.
- 6. Take your time turning pages.
- 7. The right note at the wrong time is a wrong note (and vice versa).
- 8. If everyone gets lost except you, follow those who get lost.
- 9. Strive to get the maximum NPS (note per second). That way you gain the admiration of the incompetent.
- 10. Markings for slurs, dynamics and ornaments should not be observed. They are only there to embellish the score.
- 11. If a passage is difficult, slow down. If it's easy, speed it up. Everything will work itself out in the end.
- 12. If you are completely lost, stop everyone and say, "I think we should tune".
- 13. Happy are those who have not perfect pitch, for the kingdom of music is theirs.
- 14. If the ensemble has to stop because of you, explain in detail why you got lost. Everyone will be very interested.
- 15. A true interpretation is realized when there remains not one note of the original.
- 16. When everyone else has finished playing, you should not play any notes you have left.
- 17. A wrong note played timidly is a wrong note. A wrong note played with authority is an interpretation.

11th Banff International String Quartet Competition

This year cellists were well-represented on the juries with Norman Fischer, professor of cello at the Shepherd School of Music at Rice University in Houston, TX. On the preliminary jury: András Fejér, co-founder of the Takács Quartet, professor of chamber music at the University of Colorado in Boulder and visiting fellow at the Guildhall School in London, and Richard Lester, cellist with the London Haydn Quartet and on the faculty of the Guildhall School of Royal College of Music on the competition jury. Denis Brott, founder and artistic director of the Montreal Chamber Music Festival and professor at the Montreal Conservatory of Music, was a special guest lecturer.

The winnign quartet from the USA, The Dover, also took home the R.S. Williams & Sons Haydn prize of \$3,000; the Székely Prize (best Schubert quartet performance) of \$3,000; best performance of Vivian Fung's String Quartet No. 3 (\$2,000; The custom-made set of bows by François Malo; the Esterházy Foundation price – recital in Haydn Hall at the Esterházy Palace (fee and travel expenses); 2^{nd} prize went to the Cavatine Quartet from France; 3^{rd} price to the Navarra Quartet (UK/Ireland/The Netherlands) and the prize for the best performance of a romantic quartet went to the Linden Quartet (USA/Canada).

It's a great experience to attend this competition. Unfortunately, this year I was only able to attend the last 3 days. It's an opportunity to meet and greet old frineds and colleagues from across Canada – exciting and stimulating music in gorgeous surroundings – who could ask for more. Judy Fraser

Travel Abroad with Your Instrument May Require CITES Certification

The AFM and its longtime government relations partners met in late April with US Fish and Wildlife (IJSFW) administrators to discuss public promotion of government guidelines relating to the international transport of musical instruments containing parts of federally designated endangered species materials and/or rare woods such as ivory and rosewood. A proposal to streamline rules relating to travel in and out of countries visited by instrumentalists was approved by 178 nations at a March 13 meeting of the Convention on International Trade and Endangered Species (CITES).

As USFW representatives move to update the application process for this certificate, the AFM is reaching out to all musicians and working to open gateways that will provide detailed information about how to effectively navigate the certificate application process. These mandatory federal requirements have long been in place. Many AFM members may be aware of this pretravel registration requirement. However, the policy is not widely known.

In cooperation with the USFW, the AFM, the Recording Academy, the International Society of Violin and Bow Makers, the National Association of Music Merchants, and the League of American Orchestras are working hard to get information out to professional musicians. All musicians are advised to register affected instruments. Approval can take up to 95 days. Musicians are encouraged to initiate the application process long before travel commences. It is important to strive for compliance as US customs and foreign border entry officials in each of the 178 parties to the CITES Treaty may have different entry requirements.

As we move forward, USFW will begin an aggressive outreach program that will offer additional advice and tools to help musicians navigate what can be a complicated application process. Please feel free to contact the AFM Office of Government Relations for additional information. We will bring you updates from USFW as they become available.

Elinor Harshenin – Elinor was born and raised in Vancouver, until she was sixteen, when her family moved to Europe. After five years, she returned to Vancouver and completed a Masters in English Literature at UBC. Elinor started cello at five years old, studying with Judy Fraser, Ian Hampton and Eric Wilson.
