Canada's Rolston String Quartet Takes Top Honours –

Wins the Banff BISQC Competition

On Sunday afternoon, September 4, 2016, the Rolston String Quartet won one of the most important and prestigious competitions, the Banff International String Quartet Competition which takes place every 3 years. Ten young string quartets from Asia, Europe and North America emerged from the preliminary jury process to compete in a week of concerts – all competing until the final day when the jury chose the 3 finalist quartets.

In most high-level music competitions, competitors are progressively eliminated after each round. In this one, all the quartets could be heard in the rounds preceding the finals, performing in the first round a quartet by Haydn and a 20th century work; in the second a quartet from the romantic or nationalistic repertoire and, in the third, a specially-commissioned new piece by Canadian composer, Zosha De Castri. The fourth round was music of their own choice. Each of the non-finalist quartets received a 4,000 career development grant.

In the finals, the Castalian String Quartet, from the United Kingdom, and the Tesla Quartet, from Russia, South Korea and the U.S.A. joined the Rolston in playing a quartet by Beethoven or Schubert.

Interestingly, in the first round, 8 out of 10 quartets performed Haydn and Bartok – 2 performed (including the Rolston) Haydn and Janácek. The 2 quartets who performed Janácek, performed Bartok in the round of selections of their own choice. Another interesting note: every quartet had at least one female musician and from a cellist's view, all the quartets but the Castalian, had the cellists seated inside.

After an exciting 7 days, the Rolston String Quartet, whose members all hail from Canada, won the 12th Banff International String Quartet Competition.

Here is the prize breakdown:

- 1st Prize Laureates Rolston String Quartet: One quartet will be awarded a custom-designed, three-year artistic and career development program worth over \$150,000 which includes: \$25,000 cash prize; Winner's Concert Tours in career-building markets in Europe and North America, arranged by The Banff Centre; A two-week residency at The Banff Centre including the production of a disc, recorded and produced by The Banff Centre's Music program, as well as coaching and mentoring opportunities with established artists.
- 2nd Prize Laureates Tesla Quartet: \$12,000 cash prize; A fully funded creative residency at The Banff Centre's Music program including coaching and mentoring opportunities with established artists, a \$15,000 value
- 3rd Prize Laureates Castalian String Quartet: \$8,000 cash prize; A fully funded creative residency at The Banff Centre's Music program including coaching and mentoring opportunities with established artists, a \$15,000 value
- Esterházy Foundation Prize: Recital in Haydn Hall and the Esterházy Palace in Eisenstadt (Austria), for the First Prize Laureates. Prize includes artist fee and travel expenses.
- Lunenburg Academy of Music Performance Prize: The Lunenburg Academy of Music Performance is proud to offer a fully funded, four-week residency to the winning quartet of BISQC 2016. Overlooking the UNESCO World Heritage District at Lunenburg, Nova Scotia and the stunning Atlantic Ocean, LAMP provides the successful quartet the opportunity to work and perform with its distinguished faculty, to create and present broad community outreach programming, and to perform in its 1895 concert hall, a \$18,600 yellus.
- The R.S. Williams & Sons Haydn Prize Tesla Quartet: \$3,000 for the best performance of a Haydn quartet from Round 1.
- Canadian Commission Prize, in honour of the R.S. Williams & Sons Company Tesla Quartet: \$3,000 for the best performance in Round 3 of the new commissioned quartet by a Canadian composer.
- Career Development Awards: Upon completion of the first four rounds of BISQC, all quartets not selected to the final round of the competition will receive a career development award of \$4,000.00.

There were a number of other activities to attend: a farewell concert by the Afiara Quartet and Skratch Bastid moderated by Afiara cellist, Adrian Fung; a beautiful Alumni Gala concert by the 2013 BISQC winners, the Dover Quartet (who have performed over 400 concerts in the last 3 years) with John Kimura Parker in Brahms Piano quintet and Smetana's quartet "From My Life" and a number of excellent lectures.



Joel Krosnick Mentor-in-Residence

Joel Krosnick, who retired in August as cellist of the Julliard String quartet after 42 years, has been appointed Mentor-in-residence to the competing quartets. Joel Krosnick has performed as soloist, recitalist, and chamber musician around the world. As a member of the Juilliard String Quartet since 1974, he has performed the great quartet literature throughout North America, Europe, Asia, and Australia. With his sonata partner of more than 30 years, pianist Gilbert Kalish, Mr. Krosnick has performed recitals throughout the U. S. and Europe. A dedicated teacher, Mr. Krosnick is chair of the cello department of The Juilliard School. A recipient of the Chevalier du Violoncelle Award from the Eva Janzer Memorial Cello Center at the Indiana University School of Music, Mr.

Krosnick holds honorary doctoral degrees from Michigan State University, Jacksonville University, and the San Francisco Conservatory of Music. The BISQC Mentor in Residence program is supported by an anonymous donor.

Székely/Rolston Young Musicians Program


Launched in 2010, the Székely/Rolston Young Musicians Program was created through a partnership between the Rolston and the Székely families. This initiative inspires and celebrates the next generation of great chamber musicians by creating a special, welcoming and affirming experience for young chamber ensembles as part of the Banff International String Quartet Competition. This year, we welcome the Travelling Quartet and Sakata/Kim Duo from The Phil and Eli Taylor Performance Academy for Young Artists at the Royal Conservatory of Music in Toronto, the Kolden Quartet from the Vancouver Academy of Music, and the Rundle String Quartet from Banff. These promising young musicians will attend BISQC lectures and concerts, receive coaching from some of the leading musicians of our time, and will be heard in performance.

Banff Centre and the Banff International String Quartet Competition are thrilled to be supporting the next generation of chamber musicians through this wonderful initiative by the Rolston and Székely families. The Travelling Quartet and Sakata/Kim Duo are supported in part by the SOCMI Fund for Excellence of the Royal Conservatory of Music.

It is an incredible week – more than 50 hours of music – attended by approximately 600 audience members for the week and sold out (900) for the final 3 days. As many jurors said, it is more like a festival. From The Vancouver Academy of Music faculty came Robin Wenham, Audrey Nodwell and myself. We were so very proud of the Rolstons and Olivia Cho in the Kolden Quartet (Young Musicians Program). As Jonathan Lo's cello teacher all through The Academy, a very special warm congratulations to **Audrey Nodwell**.



You Moose Play Cello - Summer Cello Camps in Rural Yukon

June 28, 2016, Nico Stephenson and I loaded seventeen cellos into a U Haul and started the drive up to the Yukon to teach cello camps in three rural communities. Nico's idea, which we had started working toward making a reality in March, was to create a series of weeklong introductory cello workshops for kids ages 5-15 in the north of Canada. The project was entirely funded by private donors and a few corporate contributions, making it completely free to all participants.

After picking up Roland Gjernes (our third cellist and teacher who had been in China until a few days earlier) in Whitehorse, we headed to Ross River to start the first week of teaching.

The first camp took place in Ross River, a community of about 300 people with very little in the way of formal music education and organized summer programming for kids. For the most part, kids in Ross River make their own schedules, most of them waking up around noon and

going to sleep around tam (when the sun doesn't set, which it doesn't in the summers

that far north, the expression "be home before dark" doesn't have quite the same effect). This was the community where Nico had come up with the idea for the Yukon Cello Project in the first place two years ago while working at the pool there for a summer. Luckily, many of the kids remembered Nico and we managed to round some of them up and show them what a cello is. Many came in for just one day or sporadically throughout the week, although a few really took to the cello and came back every day. For a music camp in Ross River, this was a massive success.



Our second stop was Dawson City, a former gold rush city with about 1000 inhabitants and a strong fiddle community. Our

Nico, Roland, and I played many concerts in other communities along the way. One such stop was Keno City, a former mining town with 15 permanent residents. An audience of around 35 welcomed us for the concert, which was just about everyone who lives in the surrounding countryside. One family had even driven five hours to hear us play. The reception at this particular concert solidified my belief that the Yukon is a place that needs more classical music programming. The desire to listen and to play is there, and we're bringing cellos and cellists to where that desire is.

Due to the strong positive response we received in each of the communities, we are planning town an expanded version of the project next year—potentially spending two weeks in each community, subsidizing the cost of cellos for those who wish to buy them, and including at least one more community. centre, and enjoy the parks nearby.



orchestral works every week and went to concerts approximately every few days. The first week, our orchestra played the symphonic suite 'On the Waterfront' by Bernstein and it was a hard piece rhythmically, but we worked hard and eventually learned it in a few days. At the same time, we also rehearsed and worked hard on the 'Polovtsian Dances' by Borodin and our final concert at the end of the week was great!

If I wasn't practicing or rehearsing with the orchestra, I went to the lounge in the dorms with my friends, played table tennis and watched movies. We also went to the farmers market in downtown Bellingham and went for ice cream!


The second week however, was a lot more stressful because I had to learn the cello solo part in 'Orpheus' by Liszt and practice for my chamber group performance that was at the end of the

week. What I found most difficult was to sustain the notes and the phrases of the solo as well as producing a nice sound. Also during the second week, another cello teacher, John Michel, came to conduct master classes, help with sectionals, and teach private lessons. In addition to 'Orpheus,' we also played the Mlada Suite by Rimsky-Korsakov at Mount Baker Theatre for our final concert that was open to the public.

His work has been featured in over seventy commercial releases ranging from pop and jazz albums, to music for ESL curriculums, to surround mixes for TV and theatre. Recent audio projects include mixes for Hasbro's animated series My Little Pony and Littlest Pet Shop, live recordings for rock band Half Moon Run, as well as recordings with the Kenyan Boys Choir. Chan is well-versed in large and small format multichannel recording, having been involved with audio and video productions with orchestras, big bands, chamber choirs, rock bands and singer-



As an active performing and session cellist, Chan collaborates frequently with west coast folk/pop artists Jordan Klassen , Zaac Pick and ambient experimental group Holy Hum. Touring across the continent has seen Chan at festivals such as the Folk Alliance International, Canadian Music Week, and Squamish Music festival. In the last year, Chan has toured Europe and North America, performing in London, Munich, and Montreal. Highlights include the Reeperbahn festival in Germany, CBC's Vinyl Café and DNTO. Chan holds a Masters in sound recording from the acclaimed Schulich School of Music of McGill University where he was under the tutelage of Multi-Grammy winning recording engineers Richard King and George Massenburg. He also was a cello student of Audrey Nodwell at the VAM, and a member of the cello section of the VYSO, and The Academy Orchestra. P.S. ♦ Born and raised in Vancouver, Bryan Deans has been leaving a lasting impression on the Vancouver classical music scene. Bryan is a cellist, conductor, music director, composer, known not only for his skill but also his energy, leadership and dedication to his art. In his role as assistant conductor of the Lions Gate Youth orchestra, he is grateful for the opportunity to work with and inspire the next His passion for classical music has bene generation of orchestral musicians. tempered with his love for other genres from rock, pop, jazz, folk and experimental, with the resulting dynamism reflecting in his choice of projects. He is also founder of Plastic Acid Orchestra, a full-symphony orchestra bent on breaking through genres and finding new fans for orchestral performance. Bryan has spent the last decade taking his full-sized symphony into uncharted territory performing at the Vancouver International Jazz Festival, The Vogue Theatre, Venue, Performance works Granville Island and collaborating with a wide variety of local artists and genres throughout these performances. Currently, he is also music director at St. John's School and a



member of WestCoast Symphony, and since receiving his degree in music from the University of Victoria, he has also been the assistant conductor of the Vancouver Philharmonic Orchestra, as well as conductor and performer in many other local ensembles.



▶ 2nd International Piatigorsky Cello Festival / Two weeks long, the 2nd International Piatigorsky Cello Festival took place at USC last May where Piatigorsky taught for 14 years. Cellist Ralph Kirshbaum joined the staff in 2008, staged the 1st festival in 2012 and the 2nd in 2016.

"Piatigorsky was really, in terms of the cello, the first great artist in the 21st century who opened the way for cellists to be soloists", says Kirshbaum, who studied with a student of Piatigorsky and played in a masterclass for Piatigorsky. Most cellists of his generation were impacted by Piatigorsky's personality, character and artistry, and the ripples went out.

Kirshbaum programmed repertoire from classics to contemporary, recruited 26 star cellists, including a number of former Piatigorsky students. The program included lunch-time series, a quintet plus series, more than 90 works were performed and there was a mass (over 100) cello ensemble. Panel discussion included 3 of former Piatigorsky students: Laurence Lesser, Mischa Maisky and Raphael Wallfisch. Yo Yo Ma had a sell-out concert, wearing a t-

shirt and performing with recital partner Kathryn Stott – music from their latest CD, "The Arc of Life". Sol Gabetta debuted with the L.A. Philharmonic in a performance of Martinu's Cello Concerto No. 1 in E Minor.

- ▶ New CD release this month "For the Love of Brahms" with violinist Joshua Bell, **cellist Steven Isserlis** and pianist Jeremy Denk. The CD includes the Brahms Double Concerto Op. 102, the 1st piano trio, and the slow movement of Schumann's Violin Concerto.
- ▶ "Go With The Flow" application of basic principles of tai chi to improve your cell-bowing technique in August 2016 Strings Magazine: (1) Relax release let go; (2) Keep your body upright; (3) Separate your weight; (4) Keep wrists open and relaxed; (5) Let your core direct the flow of energy through your body. Here's a hint regarding #3: sit in a neutral position holding the cello and your bow with your weight distributed on both "sit bones"; shift your weight to your right sit-bone as you place the bow on any string, preparing to play a M bow. Allow your weight to gradually shift to your left sit-bone while playing a M (down) bow; as you play an up (V) bow, shift your weight to your right sit-bone.
