My name is Winca Chan. I was born in Hong Kong in 1987. I came to Canada in grade 8 (13 years old). I studied with Mr. Lui Qi Ling. I play the piano and the cello and have accomplished grade 10 (RCM examination) in both instruments. Presently I study with Judy Fraser at the Vancouver Academy of Music.

I started to play the cello when I was four years old but stopped after a year. Then I started again when I was seven years old; I learned in the Hong Kong Music Office, taught by Liu Chun Ru. I attended the Hong Kong Youth Strings in the music office when I was nine years old and joined the Hong Kong Youth Music Camp in the years 1998, 2000-2002. I joined one year strings and 3 years' symphony orchestra, and attended the music festival in Hong Kong - primary and intermediate.

Ne Books for your Libi ry

"The World of Music According to Starker", by Janos Starker, Indiana University Press.

Janos Starker, now 80, has published a memoir of his life, recounting his youth in Budapest, his family's flight to the countryside to escape the Nazis, his survival of WWII, and then the true blossoming of his career. The overall format is a regular chronology interspersed with fiction and non-fiction articles on a diversity of topics which serve to reveal Starker's inner thoughts and "musical credo". A CD is included with this book: a full-length, unedited recording of his final cello recital, given in May 2002 in Chicago.

"Grisha: The Story of Russian-American Cellist Gregor Piatigorsky", by Margaret Bartley, Otis Mountain Press.

Bartley carries the reader through Piatigorsky's life in Russia, Poland, Berlin and Paris before WWII, then on to the United States, where Piatigorsky and his wife, daughter of Baron de Rothschild, sought refuge. The book is the product of extensive historical research and interviews – the story is fast-paced and gripping.

2005 Piatigorsky Seminar

And speaking of things to do this summer, the eighteenth biannual Gregor Piatigorsky Seminar for Cellists will be held June 5-11 at the USC Thornton School of Music. Twelve advanced cellists at the beginning of the professional career are chosen to participate. Auditors can attend for a fee of \$125 for the entire seminar, or \$25 per day. The daily schedule consists of a 3 hour (9:00 - 12:00) morning master class, a 3 hour (2:00 - 5:00) afternoon master class and an evening (8:00) master class or recital. New Directions Cello Festival #11

June 24-26 at Lawrence University

In its Mission Statement, the New Directions Cello Association states that its goals and those of its annual festival are to "promote awareness and interaction in the field of non-classical cello, which encompasses all styles of music not commonly taught at music schools, especially those styles which incorporate improvisation."

Last year, New Directions (ND) brought the Turtle Island String Quartet to Wisconsin among a stellar line- up of cellists representing a wide variety of styles. This year, ND Festival headliners are fiddle virtuoso Mark O'Connor, violist Carol Cook, and cellist Natalie Haas. The three comprise the Appalachian Waltz Trio and have just released the CD Crossing Bridges. James Reel reviews the CD in this month's issue of Strings Magazine. He writes: "You don't often hear viola and cello in oldtimey-style music, unless it's really old-timey, like Mozart and

Beethoven. But Mark O'Connor has recruited two superb young players to join him .. O'Connor's arrangements for this new ensemble sound entirely natural, giving everybody something interesting to do nearly all the time; the cello, for example, is almost never relegated to a simple backup role... These are spirited three-voice conversations. and the textures and interweaving melodic lines fit together perfectly. The trio will come to the New Directions Festival straight from the Mark O'Connor fiddle camp this summer.

Four other cellists will top the lineup of alternative stylists to lead workshops and perform: Greek cellist Dimos Goudaroulis, now based in Brazil, is experienced in classical, jazz, Latin and experimental music. Rushad Eggleston of New York, who has performed with Darol Anger and the Grammy nominated "Fiddlers Four," will contribute, as will Saskia Rao-de Haas of India. Rao-de Haas plays a unique half-size cello with 5 bowed strings and 10 resonating strings. Joined by a tabia player, she will present a concert of traditional Indian music. The very versatile Martha Colby, a veteran of many band and singing styles, will round out the list of guest artists.

The 11th Annual New Directions Cello Festival is a three-day event that will take place on the Lawrence University campus in Appleton, Wisconsin June 24-26. It will feature concerts, workshops, jam sessions, a Cello Big Band, a Young-People's Cello-Bration, an exhibition hall, a demonstration of electric cellos, and more.
