




AMOS YANG has performed as soloist and chamber musician throughout the United States, the Far East, and Europe, including performances at the Aspen Music Festival, the American Academy in Rome, Wigmore Hall, and Alice Tully Hall. He has collaborated in chamber music with the Ying Quartet, the Turtle Island String Quartet, pianists Ann Schein and Melvin Chen, violinist Earl Carlyss, and composer Bright Sheng. Mr. Yang's awards include the Performer's Certificate at Eastman School of Music and first prizes in the American String Teacher's Association and Grace Vamos competitions. He was finalist in the Pierre Fournier International Cello Competition, and for outstanding musical contribution he was awarded the CD Jackson Prize at the Tanglewood Music Festival Continued...

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As cellist of the Maia String Quartet from 1996-2002, Amos was involved in many educational programs, performing throughout the country for schools under the auspices of such organizations as Arts Excel, Young Audiences Inc., and the Midori Foundation. During this time he also served on the faculties of the Peabody Conservatory, the University of Iowa, Grinnell College, and the Interlochen Advanced String Quartet Institute. Mr. Yang holds Bachelor's and Master's degrees from the Juilliard School of Music. His primary teachers have included Irene Sharp, Channing Robbins, Paul Katz, and Steven Doane.

Before joining the San Francisco Symphony, AMOS YANG was a member of the Seattle Symphony, maintaining a private teaching studio as well as cultivating an active solo and chamber music life. He makes regular appearances with the Seattle Chamber Music Society and the



Olympic Music Festival and looks forward to collaborating with colleagues in the San Francisco Symphony. Born and raised in San Francisco, he is a graduate of Lowell and was a member of the San Francisco Symphony Youth Orchestra and San Francisco Boys Choir. Outside of work, family outings to "kid-friendly" places are what Amos enjoys the most. His family includes his wife, violinist Alicia Yang, and their two young children, Isabel and Noah.

Cellofest 2009

At 6:30 in the morning on Friday, Feb. 20, 16 cellists (including teachers Judith Fraser, Audrey Nodwell, Caroline Jackson) met in the middle of the check-in area of the Vancouver International Airport. This herd of cellists was heading to Banff for Cellofest. What is Cellofest? It is a three day cello-intensive workshop organized by the Vancouver Cello Club and Mount Royal College in Calgary.

First we flew to Calgary, and from there a bus transported us to Mount Royal to pick up the Calgary students. We then headed to the Banff Centre for the Arts and got right to work. After a quick

orientation session, we went off to our classes for the day: a Bach class, a technique class, and a study class, conducted by Nigel Boehm, Judith Fraser, Caroline Jackson, John Kadz, Audrey Nodwell, and Beth Sandvoss. After our classes, everyone settled into their rooms.

That evening, after a delicious buffet dinner at Vistas Restaurant (which is part of the Banff Centre), everyone

attended a concert put on by the Centre. First there was a very modern

piece, performed by composer Darren Miller, which consisted of a piano and a music box. Selections from a Messiaen piece called Vingt Regard sur L 'Enfant-Jesus were then performed by Keith Kirchoff. The final piece before the intermission was a movement from Brahms' Piano Quintet in F minor, Op. 34 performed by a quintet that included Vancouver Cello Club member Sonia Taylor, who is now studying with Mr. Kadz in

After the intermission, Ronald Leonard (who was the guest teacher at Cellofest) played two pieces with pianist Susanne

Ruberg-Gordon. First he played the Shostakovich Sonata for Cello & Piano in D minor, Op.40 with precision and exciting musicality. His next piece was Piatti's Rimembranze del Trovatore, Op. 20 in which Mr. Leonard amazed everyone with his technical fluidity and musical character. After the concert, we went to bed after a very full first day.

On the second day (after practice sessions and another buffet meal), we

witnessed Mr. Leonard's inspirational teaching in the master classes. From

9:30 am until 8:30 pm, with breaks for lunch and dinner, we watched students perform for Mr. Leonard. The advice, ideas, and overall thoughts Mr. Leonard came up with for the students were amazing. It seemed that with each piece, he knew exactly what each note should sound like. Also, when he played short bits of pieces (standing up!) so the student would know what he

that you would think he had been practicing each piece all night. Some ideas Mr. Leonard touched on were: bow distribution, right-hand fluidity, bow speed, balance of the entire body, phrasing, and appreciation for every single note. Also on the second day, Henk Guittart, a baroque specialist who plays viola, held master classes in which students played unaccompanied Bach movements. Many ideas were brought up in the classes that cellists often overlook. Some baroque-specific

was talking about, he played with such confidence and perfection

ideas Mr. Guittart talked about were: use open strings whenever possible; do not vibrate double stops with open strings; always trill starting with the top note; use lots of bow; sing your part.

> The basic ideas Mr. Guittart had for varying right-hand sounds were: bow pressure, length, place, and the amount of bow hair used. Henk Guittart also had some interesting practice ideas. He suggested sometimes practicing in the dark because it allows

you to listen more closely to the music and forces you not to look at your

hands. Another practice idea he had was specifically for the prelude to the fourth suite. He suggested that one person play the bottom notes and someone else play the top notes -this is how it should sound when a single person plays it. He also emphasized practicing with a metronome (as did Mr. Leonard).

After a full day of master classes, we had free time to practice, swim in the pool, or catch up on some much-needed rest. The swimming resulted in an aquatic basketball game consisting of Vancouver students and Mr. Kadz. We found out that Mr. Kadz is not only a superior cellist, but also a supreme aquatic basketball

machine.

The final day was hectic but still enjoyable. After a hearty breakfast and some practicing, the final sessions with Mr. Leonard took place. At 3 pm, we got on the bus and headed to the airport in a frantic dash to catch our flight. We arrived in Vancouver safely and went to our respective homes. The adventure finally ended when the cellos were picked up Monday morning at the airport.


Cellofest was a highly enlightening experience which opened our eyes to

CELLOFEST 2009 - At 6:15 am on February 20th, thirteen bright-eyed, bushy-tailed (ish) young cellists, three teachers, and thirteen bubble-wrapped cellos departed YVR for Banff to attend Cellofest 2009. We were joined by cellists from across Canada for a weekend full of masterclasses, lessons, concerts and group classes at the beautiful Banff Centre.


After picking up students from Mount Royal College in Calgary, our bus headed over to the Banff Centre where we promptly delved into our first classes. These included Technique with John Kadz or Judy Fraser, as well as Bach and Study classes with Nigel Boehm, Audrey Nodwell, Beth Sandvoss, or Caroline Jackson.

Following those two and a half hours of classes, we flooded to Vistas, the Banff Centre's restaurant, for a well-earned dinner. Returning Cellofest attendees were a little apprehensive about this new venue since the old cafeteria had served excellent food, and we weren't sure this new place could live up to our standards. We were not to be let down! In fact, the general consensus was that the food this year was even better than last time.

After at least three helpings each of everything (including dessert) we hurried back to the Rolston Recital Hall for the much-anticipated concert. This year we were fortunate enough to have Ronald Leonard, the esteemed professor at Colburn School, as our guest. Mr. Leonard wowed us all with the Shostakovich cello Sonata and Piatti's Rimembranze del Trovatore.

The concert also featured a exceptional chamber group of students from Mount Royal College, including V.C.C. member, Sonia Taylor. Next morning, the masterclasses began. Over the course of the weekend, 26 cellists performed for Mr. Leonard and 31 performed a Bach movement for Mr. Henk Guittart for a total of 21 and a half hours of masterclasses. Everyone who performed for Mr. Leonard learned a lot about their pieces and about playing in general. Those who played for Mr. Guittart received outstanding coaching on their Bach. Being taught by both these musicians was definitely the highlight of the weekend.

Sunday afternoon saw the Calgary students back to the College, and the rest of us flying home, undoubtably to practice, practice,

- Last October, STEVEN ISSERLIS, gave a masterclass at the Kennedy Center, sponsored by The Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts and The Kindler Cello Society of Washington. Janos Starker, Pierre Fournier and Jean-Guihen Queyras have taped (DVD) the 3rd Suite and Anner Bylsma has a video of the 1st and 5th Suites. There is often a lag between the DVDs audio and video tracks. Mostly it is cellists who buy and view these discs and we are interested in how the cellist plays, not in shots of bows, scrolls, frescos, bridges, etc. We especially would like to see both hands in the same shot!!

Excerpt from the Kindler Cello Society of Washington, D.C. Spring 2009 Newsletter (The material on the 5 DVDs was written by Robert Battey, Director.

This concerns the DVD by Paul Tortelier which I thought would be of interest to all.)

"TORTELIER

This is a remarkable, poignant document. Tortelier was present at the original Casals Festival in Prades in 1950. He worshipped Casals, particularly his Bach interpretations, and when he was invited to play the six Suites in the same venue on the fortieth anniversary of the first festival, he was deeply honored. Shortly before the concerts, his cardiologist diagnosed a potentially fatal heart condition and recommended immediate surgery. Knowing that this would force him to withdraw, Tortelier declined. He played the concerts and was dead a few months later.

This is the only live, unedited performance of the Suites, and the sense of occasion is palpable even without knowing the back-story. There, in the old stone Abbey of Saint-Michel de Cuxa, where the historic Casals concerts had taken place, the artist holds the audience rapt. His unorthodox technique is all there; using the thumb in the lower positions and the pinky in the upper ones. The sound is remarkably strong for anyone, let alone a man in his mid-80s and virtually at death's door. While there are certainly many flaws, this is a true demonstration of the performer's art. Unlike all the other performers discussed here, Tortelier is playing for a real audience, and scales his sound and expression accordingly. His face is a study in intensity, with sometimes the light of madness in his eye. An unforgettable experience.

The camera work is limited, almost amateurish, given the setting. There are three cameras; one from way over on the side, one almost directly below him in the audience, and another farther back. The latter should have been the principal shot, but there is too much reliance on the two closer cameras, both offering less-than-ideal vantage points."


