Membership in the American Cello Council was maintained at a cost of The 1996 Cello Congress was held in June in Tempe, Judith Fraser attended and found the Congress very Arizona. stimulating and inspiring.

Three Newsletters were published and were greatly appreciated for the wealth of important and useful information. Gaye Keep very kindly does the address labels on her computer.

The Club received a number of donations, several of a very generous level, of whom Gordon Young was again conspicuous. These enabled the Club activities to proceed, particularly the workshops. The Club is deeply grateful to the donors.

Membership total for this year was 71. Special thanks to Catherine Carmack for recruiting 18 new members.

The high point of the year was perhaps the celebration of Past President Audrey Piggott's 90th birthday with a recital by Robert Bardston, during which a group of VSO cellists led by Lee Duckles played a lively and fascinating work commissioned for the occasion from Sean Varah. A social hour followed in which old friendships were renewed, new friendships made and fond recollections recounted. 150 members and guests were present . Robert Bardston conducted three workshops in the following two days, with 7 participants at the junior level, 11 at the senior level and 10 adults.

The concert and workshop were subsidized from the Club accounts to the extent of \$1,692.50.

Approval of the accounts and the accompanying report was moved by Judith Fraser; seconded by Michael Olsen. In passing the motion unanimously, members expressed the appreciation of the Club to Judith for her devoted work as Treasurer and general organizer.

Presentation of Awards

Lee Duckles reported on the audition for the Caroline E. Riley Scholarship (for students leaving home base for the first time to further their studies). The audition was held in South Burnaby High School Auditorium by Lee Duckles and Ian Hampton.

The four applicants all performed to a very high standard; adjudicators found themselves faced with a difficult decision: in the result, a prize of \$1,000 was awarded to Rebecca Wenham for study at Harid Conservatory of Music; one of \$500 to Michael Olsen for study at the University of Toronto, and bursaries of \$300 each were awarded from the Graeme Ingram Fund to Jonathan Braunstein for study at Banff and Jennika Anthony-Shaw for study at McGill.

Bursaries for Summer Study were awarded to Tyr Klyman-Mowczan, Alex Dunfield, David Brewster, Joel Aird, Robin Miller, Leah Zielinski, Caitlin McKee, and Andrew Higgs.

The meeting congratulated all the recipients and wished them well in their studies.

5TH American Cello Congress May 29 - June 1, 1996 / ASU, Tempe, Arizona

Every Cello Congress I have attended has been so packed with activities, new music, stimulating discussions, performances and energizing visits with colleagues that first memories are a revolving kaleidoscope. This one was no exception and although smaller than the others, it had a flavour all its own. The 5th American Cello Congress honored Zara Nelsova, artist and pedagogue, President of the Violoncello Society of New York; Janos Starker, virtuoso cellist and Distinguished Professor at Indiana University, President of the Eva Janzer Memorial Cello Centre, and Esther Prince, music manager, Executive Director of the American Cello Congress and Administrator / Treasurer of the Violoncello Society of New York.

ASU is a beautiful campus, an arborarium in its own right. Every morning those of us who stayed in Pala Verde East (\$15 a night) had a 15 minute walk (hot at 8 am), accompanied by bird songs, across the campus, a vivid blue sky background to warm brick and variegated greens.
Gammage Hall, designed by Frank Lloyd
Wright, sits superbly on its green lawns
surrounded by graceful palm trees. The music building is circular, a simple version of Gammage and since I was there 6 years ago, a long wing of practice rooms, and a wing with the Katzin Concert Hall and an organ Hall has been added.

A very special thanks go to Taki Atsumi, President of the Arizona Cello Society and President of the American Cello Council, for hosting the congress through the ASU and the School of Music. It takes a lot of organizing and I salute Sally Atsumi for all the work behind the scenes. I was so impressed when I arrived to register, to be greeted by Sally with "Hi Judy, how's Vancouver?" – after six years!!

- Fragments of Highlights -

Master classes with Fritz Magg, George Neikrieg (wonderful word pictures for 2nd movement of Debussy Sonata); Zara Nelsova (who will forget her definition of maintaining intensity - "like an unbroken line of poured molten gold" which she saw in Australia; Janos Starker's technique (shifts!!!) and Master classes ("Youth gives joy and a reason to live for a while."); Lawrence Lesser (different approach to sound – "Use the cello to excite the molecules in the air"); Eleanore Schoenfeld ("When you practice slowly, you can think"), ("Don'the lay faster than you can the layer than you can the lay hear"); David Baker ("There are 3 kinds of people on this earth: those that can count and those than can't."); Ron Leonard ("Ask students how and what they are doing. No thought process is going on with most young students."); lots of notes and ideas and different perspectives for my students. Also confirmation that I'm on the right track.

Such a wealth of performances: Stephen Kates in an incredibly moving "The Cellist of Sarajevo" - a lament in Rondo form for Solo Cello which he called a circular lament requesting no applause and dedicating it for all who have died in the senseless acts of barbarism that plague our society.

A Tribute to Hideo Saito - The Saito Cello Ensemble: led by Tsuyoshi Tsutsumi and Ko Iwasaki. I'll never like the Tschaikowsky Serenade for Strings any other way! The sonority of 18 impeccably played celli was glorious.

Zara Nelsova's strength and intensity in the Bloch Suite No. 1 for Unaccompanied Cello (a joy for me to hear as it was the first time "in the flesh") and a delightful Haydn Sonata in C. What fun to have Starker join Nelsova for an encore - Boccherini Sonata in C for Two Celli - well known to all of us teachers!

The Alternative Cello - 3 views with Mark Summers (Turtle Island Quartet), Eugene Freisen, David Baker with accompanist Howard Levy. For me, Eugene Freisen was such an exciting performer all in one, complete with vocals - an eye & ear opener.

A great panel discussion "Career Development" with Eleanore Schoenfeld, Evan Drachman, Ron Leonard, Larry Lesser, Janos Starker, George Moquin and Esther Prince. Good material emerged for teachers and excellent quotes. I enjoyed Starker's "Limelight is not the measure of a career", and Lesser's "A career is being active in something you love." agrees competitions are needed so management can sell, but standards are so high, management can't tell who is best. Joachim said "It takes 1/3 talent, 1/3 character, 1/3 health" and the deciding factor is character – it is vital to have the drive and desire to follow a dream.

For me it was renewal time to visit with Zara Nelsova (and plan for our Cello Fest in Banff next November) and Tsuyoshi Tsutsumi; have a chat with Larry Lesser to enquire after Carina Reeves and Ron Leonard to tell him about Becky Wenham and Jonathan Braunstein's plans for 1996-

As usual, I really recommend attendance at these Congresses. Moving out of one's comfort zone is always stimulating and the opportunity is economically viable. Next year the 2nd World Cello Congress will be held in St. Petersburg and in 1998, the 3rd Cello Festival will be in Manchester, England. That one I plan to take in. The 2nd Leonard Rose Competition is Maryland July 1997.

Letter from Markus Stocker to Judy - May 16, 1996

"Dear Judith

How are you? It is a long time I did not get a Newsletter from the Vancouver Cello Club. I hope everything is fine.

I thought of you when we recently had a "Cello Extravaganza". The Queensland section of AUSTA (Australian string teachers Association) honoured my wife and me by organizing a three day cello convention: we had 120 cellists, mainly from Queensland (till up to Caims), but also seniors coming from Victoria and NSW. It was a big success and it was decided to repeat the thing in 1998, then at the new Con where we are moving in July. The first staff recital I started with a Bach Suite, then I played the Boccherini Duo with Mei-Lee, then Misky, Popper Requiem, Scott Joplin Quartet and a Bach arrangement for 5 cellists. In the final concert we combined all forces first for the Australian fare and at the end for Mozart's Ave Verum. Inbetween smaller ensembles, I conducted the Consecration Hymn by Grützmacher (48 cellists), Hymnus for 12 cellos by Klengel, Scott Joplin etc. It was great fun, and so many youngsters felt suddenly it was the most natural thing to carry around and play the cello. Too often in their school classes they feel lonely, specially on the countryside. I just played in Caims and Macquay and gave classes: lots of talents, but poor teaching... How is Lee Kum Sing? Does he play again. I would like to visit you people again. Do you see any opportunity? I even could play all Bach Suites and give classes.

In September I visit all Australian Conservatoriums to meet my new colleagues and their classes. I would like to see more exchange and communication.

Have a wonderful summer and receive my cordial greetings over the Ocean."

Having completed my freshman year of the B.M. program at the Harid Conservatory, I am full of praises for this school. I am thrilled with my past year at Harid and I can't wait to begin again in September. I would recommend this school to almost every callist I know.

Her disposition, like the Okanagan, was always sunny - an inspiration to family and friends."
