Michael Unterman in Concert

May 24, 4:00 p.m.KRH, VancouverAcademy of Music

PROGRAM:

This program is my attempt at a quick overview of the most important music for baroque cello, both with continuo and for the solo instrument. It comprises of music written in the three most dominant national styles of the baroque period, Italian, French and German, starting with the earliest music written for cello, which came out of the city of Bologna. From there we move to music by two German masters, Georg Philipp Telemann and J.S. Bach, featuring my own transcription of Teleman's first Fantasia for violin, and a brief experiment which will juxstapose Bach's music for solo cello with his music for solo keyboard. The program will then conclude with a ridiculous and flashy sonata by the French cellist-composer Jean-Baptiste Barriere.

ichael Unterman enjoys a busy performing career on both modern and baroque cellos, with the last couple years focussed mainly on the baroque side of things as a student of Phoebe Carrai in Juilliard's Historical Performance program. Highlights from the program include performances with many leading baroque musicians, including Jordi Savall, Richard Egarr, Masaaki Suzuki, William Christie and Robert Mealy. He received critical acknowledgement as part of the "heroic continuo team" (*Parterre Box*) in a fully staged production of Handel's *Radamisto*, conducted by Julian Wachner, and was lauded for his "brilliant" playing (*Seen and Heard International*) in a performance of the orchestral arrangement of Bach's Goldberg Variations, led by Monica Huggett. He has also been featured in chamber music performances at Alice Tully Hall, Trinity Wall Street and the



New York early music series Music Before 1800. Upcoming summer projects include a residency at the Saint Lawrence String Quartet Seminar at Stanford (with the program's first ever gut string group), a production of Monteverdi's *L'incoronazione di Poppea* led by Richard Egarr at the Britten-Pears Institute in England, and a residency with William Christie and Les Arts Florissants in Thiré, France. Then, in the coming fall and winter, Michael will perform with period instrument ensemble Gut Reaction in Vancouver, Seattle, and Washington, D.C., with the Harvard Baroque Chamber Orchestra as soloist in performances of C.P.E. Bach's A Major Cello Concerto, and with the Bishop's Band in a program of Peruvian and Bolivian baroque music as part of Trinity Wall Street's Twelfth Night Festival. He will also be returning for the 2014-15 season to his position with the Boston-based (modern instrument) chamber orchestra A Far Cry. Michael is an alum of the New England Conservatory where he studied with Laurence Lesser and Natasha Brofsky, and was the recipient of a Fulbright grant in 2008 to study in Barcelona, Spain with Lluis Claret. And before all this, he was, of course, a long-time student of the wonderful Judy Fraser at the Vancouver Academy of Music.



BYRON SCHENKMAN has recorded more than thirty CDs of 17th- and 18th-century repertoire, including recordings on historical instruments from the National Music Museum, Vermillion, and the Museum of Fine Arts, Boston. In 1999 he received the Erwin Bodky Award from the Cambridge Society for Early Music "for outstanding achievement in the field of early music." Schenkman made his New York recital debut on modern piano in 2009 and his playing was described in *The New York Times* as "sparkling," "elegant," and "insightful." He is a member of the period instrument ensemble Gut Reaction and has been a featured guest with the Chameleon Arts Ensemble of Boston, the Daedalus Quartet, the Northwest Sinfonietta, Pacific Baroque Orchestra, Philharmonia Northwest, and the Portland Baroque Orchestra. He also

appears frequently in recital with violinist Ingrid Matthews, with whom he co-founded the Seattle Baroque Orchestra in 1994. In 2013 he launched "Byron Schenkman & Friends," a new Baroque and Classical chamber music series at Benaroya Hall in Seattle. Schenkman is a graduate of the New England Conservatory and received his master's degree with honors in performance from the Indiana University School of Music. He currently teaches at Seattle University and Cornish College of the Arts. In 2012 he also served as guest lecturer in harpsichord and fortepiano at the Indiana University Jacobs School of Music. www.byronschenkman.com

IVORY BAN IMPACT ON ORCHESTRAS!

On February 25, 2014, new strict limits immediately took effect for traveling with instruments that contain elephant ivory. Following a new Obama Administration effort to protect African elephants from poaching by combating illegal trade in ivory, the director of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS) ordered strict enforcement procedures related to the Endangered Species Act and the African Elephant Conservation Act. According to the order, many instruments containing African elephant ivory will not be allowed into the U.S., even if a musician is simply returning to the U.S. with instruments in their personal possession, not intended for sale. The timeframe for actual implementation of this as musicians travel through U.S. Customs is uncertain.

Under the new rules, a musical instrument containing African elephant ivory may only be brought into the US if it meets the following criteria:

- Was legally acquired prior to February 26, 1976;
- Has not subsequently been transferred from one person to another person for financial gain or profit since February 26, 1976;
- The person or group qualifies for a <u>CITES musical instrument certificate</u> (http://americanorchestras.org/advocacy-government/travel-with-instruments/endangered-species-material/protected-species-travel-tips.html); and
- The musical instrument containing African elephant ivory is accompanied by a valid CITES musical instrument certificate or an equivalent CITES document.


It is not uncommon for professional orchestra musicians, particularly string players, to perform with instruments that contain small amounts of ivory, most frequently found in the tips of bows. It can be difficult to distinguish African elephant ivory from other types of ivory used in minute amounts. A great many musical instruments containing African elephant ivory, while legally manufactured and acquired, would have been purchased after 1976, and will now be completely prohibited from entering into the U.S. Still others that have not been sold since 1976 may be missing key documentation. The League is in ongoing dialogue with the USFWS to seek a solution that addresses wildlife conservation goals while also protecting international musical activity that requires musicians to travel across borders with the tools of their trade.

DVORAK CELLO CONCERTO NEW MANUSCRIPT FOUND, NEW INSIGHTS FOR PERFORMANCE?

Background of the Event:

In 2012, a previously unknown manuscript of the Concerto's solo cello part came to light. It had been preserved by the family of the favorite cello student of Alwin Schroeder (1855-1928). Schroeder was principal cellist of the Boston Symphony, with which he was soloist in the first complete U.S. performance of the Concerto, in 1896. He worked with Dvorak in New York to prepare for that appearance, and this handwritten copy was the result of their collaboration. Two years ago, the manuscript was brought to the attention of experts from the Violoncello Society and the Dvorak American Heritage Association, and was recognized as an authentic document that had never been seen or examined by music historians. The April 5 event is the very first public exposition and exploration of this landmark discovery.

Content of the Event:

- A panel of prominent musicologists and cellists will discuss the manuscript, its differences from familiar editions, and its implications for scholarship and performance.
