Isidora began her musical studies at the age of two using her brother's toy electric guitar as a cello and a wooden spoon as a bow. When she was four she began taking lessons on a real cello at the Vancouver Academy of Music with teacher Audrey Nodwell. Over the years she's had the privilege of working with artists and teachers from all over the world, some of whom include Steven Isserlis, Judith Fraser, Paul Marleyn, Ronald Leonard, Matt Haimovitz, Norman Fischer, John Kadz, and Pinchas Zukerman. She has participated in programs like the Annual Belgrade Cello Fest, Domaine Forget, National Arts Centre Young Artists' Program, Valhalla Summer School of Music, and Banff Cello Fest. She won the Friends of Chamber Music Competition in 2008 with friends and cellists Carol Tsai and Jennifer Son, was national finalist in 2006 and 2008 and Provincial finalist in 2010 for the Canadian Music Competition, and received the Roderick H. Macrae scholarship at the Academy Senior Strings Competition 2011. This year she is honoured to be principal cellist of the Vancouver Youth Symphony Orchestra, Lord Byng Senior Honour Orchestra, and Lord Byng Symphony Orchestra. In addition, she will be giving a graduation recital at the Vancouver Academy of Music on



May 30 of this year. As a member of the Vancouver Cello Club since the age of seven, she is extremely excited to be presented with the Caroline E. Riley Scholarship and she would like to thank the Vancouver Cello Club for all of the amazing opportunities they have given her over the years. ■

"Distinguished Artists Series", Johannes Moser, cello

With his stunning blue eyes, fair hair, and sharp features, you would have to agree that German-Canadian cellist, Johannes Moser, is one handsome musician. As part of the "Distinguished Artists Series", five students had the privilege of performing in the December 3rd, 2010 master class on December 3rd at the Academy: Sakurako Ono and Nicholas Denton (Elgar Cello Concerto), Tate Zawadiuk (Haydn C+ Concerto), David Shin (Schumann 'Adagio and Allegro') and yours truly, Diane Yeo (Dvorak 'Rondo'). Throughout the master class, Moser's humorous personality and love for making music was evident for all in attendance.

Johannes Moser emphasized the importance of physical preparation with regard to shifting and sound production. In a fascinating exchange, he demonstrated how the cello can emulate the tonal colours of different orchestral instrument: one moment a French Horn, the next a Bass Trombone; he described the pursuit of a palette of varying timbres as "a quest without conclusion".

The following evening, I had the pleasure of hearing Mr. Moser perform the Schumann Cello Concerto with the Vancouver Symphony Orchestra. The performance was filled romantic lyricism, stunning virtuosity, and sincere artistry - in short, all of the Johannes Moser so eloquently discussed the night before.

TATE ZAWADIUK - congratulations on your extraordinary cello year!

Tate's passion for playing the cello began at the age of 3. He has been a student of Mary Thomson at the Vancouver Academy of Music since he was 5 years old. Over the past 10 years he has participated in numerous solo concerts, masterclasses, competitions, festivals, summer camps, orchestras and chamber ensembles, winning many awards and scholarships. Tate won the 2010 Burnaby Clef Concerto Competition for musicians aged 12 to 23 from all orchestral musical disciplines and performed with the Vancouver Symphony Orchestra. He was also awarded the John Parker



Memorial Scholarship for having the highest mark in the competition. Tate was one of the students selected to play at Mr. Aldo Parisot's masterclasses at the Cellofest held in Vancouver in June 2010. Tate has since played in masterclasses for Lynn Harrell, Ron Leonard, and Timothy Eddy. He was the youngest participant to be accepted into the Morningside Music Bridge Program last year and played at the Mount Royal University Feast 2010 concert. Tate was offered a scholarship to study with John Kadz at the Mount Royal University that year and now travels to Calgary once or twice per month. In February, he played as a soloist for a series of educational concerts with the Vancouver Symphony Orchestra. Most recently, he has been invited to play as a soloist for the New Westminster Symphony Orchestra in May 2011. Tate is a French emersion student in Coquitlam. He is an enthusiastic golfer, baseball player and skier. He also enjoys acting and public speaking. Tate's love for playing cello resonates with every note.

The latest news of Tate is that he is the Junior Strings delegate of the Kiwanis Music Festival to the "Performing Arts of BC" Provincial Music Festival in Kamloops. Also the recipient of the VKMFS Intermediate Cello 20th C Composers Medallion and a \$200 award from the Carlton and Helen Young Scholarship. Tate is also heading to the National Finals of the Canadian Music Competition in June. ■

Banff Cellofest 2011

In February, a group of young cellists from Vancouver, Calgary, Medicine Hat, and Kelowna convened at the Banff Center for the Performing Arts for an exciting weekend of master classes. This year, the students were thrilled to be coached by inspirational Finnish cellist Anssi Kartunnen and enigmatic violist Henk Guittart among teachers Audrey Nodwell, Beth Sandvoss, Nigel Boehm, and Kiril Kalmykov. We were wellsupported by collaborative pianist Julia Haager.

On Friday morning, the Vancouver contingent arrived at YVR dark and early at 5:15 am with our cumbersome flight cases and in some instances, bubble wrap to protect our cellos. After a short flight, we met up with the Alberta students at Mount Royal University in -25 Calgary weather. We arrived at the Banff Center after a scenic bus ride and immediately started in on a rotation of Bach, technique, and study classes with the Calgary and Vancouver teachers.

That evening, we were all treated to a wonderful performance at the Rolston Recital Hall. The first half featured a number of young musicians and ensembles who played original contemporary pieces. We all enjoyed the first half but the cellists were really looking forward to the second half of the recital when cellist Anssi Kartunnen would play with the Zebra Trio. Mr. Kartunnen would be our masterclass coach for the duration of the weekend. Needless to say, it was probably one of the largest numbers of cellists that had ever attended one concert at the Banff center. We all went to bed full from the delicious buffet and looking forward to learning a lot during our master classes in the next two days.

Next morning, we all awoke to a sumptuous breakfast buffet at the famously amazing Vistas restaurant which gave us the energy to enjoy a full day of master classes with both Anssi and Henk. For those of us who played for Anssi, he gave us thoughtful coaching on everything from musicality, phrasing, vibrato, bow stroke, and posture. His classes were informative and stimulating for both musician and audience. Henk,



a favourite of returning Cellofest participants, continued to coach our Bach classes with enthusiasm and insight. After Saturday afternoon, we were all happy to know we still had another evening and morning of masterclasses ahead of us.

Saturday night, after eating dinner and dessert - some of us two or three desserts - at Vistas, the cellists gathered for an evening master class with Anssi Kartunnen. He talked about listening to the way the piano plays a melody and imitating how simple it sounds when played without bowings getting in the way. He also talked about blending with the piano occasionally in order to make an entirely new sound. Sonia Taylor (currently studying at Mount Royal University with John Kadz) played the Saint-Saens Cello Concerto, making an appearance at her fifth Cellofest.

The following morning we all gathered with instruments in hand for a technique class with Anssi. Much to our surprise, he talked the

entire time. That is not to say that it wasn't an inspiring class. He touched on many points, emphasizing the importance of finding a comfortable playing position, one in which you will never become tired or sore. He also warned us not to over-think the technical aspects of our playing.

When asked how to do a smooth bow change, he simply replied "you change the direction of the bow".

Finally, everyone boarded the bus to the airport and Calgary. Just before we left, Henk "more bow" Guittart got on the bus for a last minute goodbye and to make sure everyone knew when to practice shifts slurred (always) and when to use more bow (always). We had each played in a master class on Bach for Henk, a viola professor at the Banff Centre. Besides his many tips on how to practice and how to play in a

baroque style, Henk had shared with us his well-researched theory that the Bach Suites for unaccompanied cello were in fact written for the viola da spalla, a baroque instrument similar to the viola. Although stricken by the believability of his theory, many of the young cellists I spoke to chose not to believe it on principal, the idea being a bit of a blow to their cellistic pride.

From the very beginning, when brave parents drove the Vancouver cellists over the mountains in the snow, Cello Fest has brought superb cello teachers like Zara Nelsova and Ronald Leonard to the Banff centre for one weekend of intensive master classes and fun. For many of us this was our second or third Banff Cello Fest and each year has been more inspiring and informative than the last. The same will surely be said about many more Banff Cello Fests to come.

NEWS FROM NICO STEPHENSON...

I just finished my first year at the relatively unknown University of Montreal, studying with the marvelous Johanne Perron. I had met Mme. Perron at Domaine Forget two summers ago, and chose U of M purely based on her, but when I arrived I found out that the faculty is filled with worldrenowned teachers. The strings department is made up of wonderful teachers in each instrument, with the cello teachers being Mme. Perron, Carole Sirois, Yuli Turovsky and Yegor Dyachkov. This extremely high level of teaching is present across

the faculty, which makes for a wonderful learning environment. The main obstacle, however, is the French.

Being a francophone university, all classes are supposed to be taught in French. However, there are ways to get most of the instruction in English. For example, all the teachers speak English, so private lessons and chamber music don't have to be in French. Also, the conductor of the university orchestra, Jean-Francois Rivest, knows which musicians are Anglophones, and will give any personal instruction to them in

English. Furthermore, the university has a close relationship with McGill, and all courses can be taken at either university. This makes ear training, history and harmony much easier if needed. Most of all, the students almost all speak English, and are very welcoming to anyone who comes to the school.

Overall, this year has been a great experience, and I am happy I chose the U of M and Mme.
Perron. I believe it is one of the premier music schools in Canada.

News from Evan Buttar at U of Ottawa (March)

It's been really busy, but enjoying myself a lot. I played in two masterclasses so far this semester, for Paul Pulford and Vernon Regehr. I played the Rococo Variations Theme, Variations 1, 2, 3, and 7 for both. I'm playing in a masterclass for Thomas Wiebe this Sunday, and in that I am playing the Bach 5th Suite Prelude and Allemande. I always remember you telling me to take every masterclass opportunity that comes, and have been applying that to studio as well (so far, I've played in every studio class but one). We're playing Brahms' Tragic Overture and Requiem in orchestra now, last concert was the Firebird Suite and Shostakovich Symphony No.1, as well as a guitar concerto. I did apply to the second two weeks of Domaine, The International Cello Festival of Canada (Paul's event in Winnipeg), and this week am applying to the Tafelmusik Baroque Summer Institute.

I'm playing Mendelssohn's 4th string quartet (Op.44 No.2) in ensemble right now, and the score book you gave me is really coming in handy. For cello ensemble, we're doing Fratres, Bach violin Chaconne (Raphael, Jon, and I have the first part - it's really challenging!), a 10 cello arrangement of Yesterday, Popper Requiem, Bach's "O Jesus Christ! Je fimplore", and Song of the Birds. And I think I told you but not 100% sure, I started taking viola da gamba lessons with Barbara Zuchowicz last semester, and have taken one or two this semester as well. I'm using the schools gamba, not playing it a ton but enjoying it when I do. I've also started experimenting with a baroque cello bow.
