



This year the 4th Cellofest was held in Banff February 16-18 with Steven Doane, Mastercellist from Eastman School of Music, Rochester, N.Y. Unfortunately for the Vancouver students, there was a major conflict with the Vancouver Academy of Music Orchestral Concert February 18th. However, 19 of us, including teachers Judith Fraser, Audrey Nodwell, Kristl Armstrong and Catherine Carmack, students James Takazawa, Wesley Attawell, and Jonathan Lo who played for Steven Doane, and other keen cellists Eric Finley, Laura McKnight, Iris Graham, Tejas Mador, Eric Thewalt, Heather Brewster, Dawn Binnington, Decia Moss, and Mrs. Lo, climbed aboard Air Canada bound for Calgary, where we all linked up with the contingent from Mount Royal College under the direction of John Kadz. If your interest lies more in the vernacular music category, you might want to check out the Mel Bay publication Crossing to Scotland, celtic music for cello arranged by Abby Newton. Ms. Newton is a classically trained cellist who has adapted her personal playing to the relaxed lilting feel of Scottish music. The CD that accompanies the collection is lovely, and includes fiddle, celtic harp, piano, guitar, accordion and upright bass. The music uses only up to 4th position and would be particularly good for students and amateurs who want to explore this genre.

A Few Words About Etudes and Exercises

by Michael Haber, Head of Cello Faculty at University of Ohio at Akron

"To put it plainly, the traditional techniques used for building a fine command of a string instrument work. These techniques are scales in a variety of fingerings and bowings, in thirds, sixths, octaves and arpeggios, finger and trill exercises in all positions, shifting exercises, bowing exercises, etudes and so on.

These activities should play a significant role in your daily work. They are our way of toning and developing the physical skills required for excellent cello playing. Neglecting them results in a variety of weaknesses and technical failings which remain unsolved, causing tremendous frustration. If you overdo and spend an inordinate amount of time on these kinds of materials, you can strain yourself, perhaps severely hurt yourself, and also risk mistaking means for ends. It is an admirable achievement to play Popper and Piatti etudes on a high level, but these pieces are not goals in and of themselves.

You need to organize a way of doing all these things every day. What should be done, and how much should be done, is different for every person and depends on the level of playing and of physical preparation. I cannot make a formula which will be useful but I will say that, eventually, 30-40% of your practise time should be spent on these instrumental building activities. Let me warn you, however, in case you are working on your own, that all finger and trill exercises should be done in moderation. 15 minutes a day is plenty, less than that will do if you are out of shape or just beginning to build some of these skills. Here is some information which will help you organize this kind of work in a general way. First, a list of some of the etude and exercise books which I find useful. Of course, there are there are others, and other good ones, and I have no objection to working from other books."
