Brian Yoon Cello

A winner of the 2011 S^yIva Gelber Music Foundation Award, twent^y-five ^year old cellist Brian Yoon is emerging as a significant young artist in Canada. As a soloist, Brian has been featured in Performances with the Vancouver Academy, the University of Ottawa, the Guelph Symphony, and the Ottawa Symphony Orchestras. His Performance of the First Shostakovich Concerto at the National Arts Centre was praised by the Ottawa Citizen as an "impressive account" with "exquisite phrasing". Last summer, he was invited to take part in the International Cello Festival of Canada in Winnipeg.

Born in Seoul, Korea, Brian started music lessons at the age of six. After immigrating to Canada, he continued cello studies with Judith Fraser at the Vancouver Academy of Music, where he was awarded the Certificate in Music Performance. He has attended the international Morningside Music Bridge Program and the NAC's Young Artists Program, as well as participating in master classes at Banff, Domaine Forget and Orford. He holds a Bach. of Music from the Univ. of Ottawa, and he recently completed graduate studies at Rice University with Desmond Hoebig. Brian will be assuming the position of Principal Cello with the Victoria Symphony in fall 2012.

Todd Yaniw Piano

26-year-old pianist Todd Yaniw is increasingly in demand as a soloist and chamber musician. Since his debut with the Edmonton Symphony Orchestra at age 13, Mr. Yaniw has performed frequently in Alberta and Ontario at many festivals and venues, including the Banff Centre and The Royal Conservatory's new Koerner Hall. Internationally, Todd has performed in Monaco, Jamaica, China, London, England, New York City, and Rochester, New York. He has performed with the symphony orchestras of Toronto, Kitchener-Waterloo, Windsor, and Guelph. Yaniw released his first CD on the Chestnut Hall Music label in September 2006.

Upcoming engagements include Todd's fourth concerto performance with the Toronto Symphony Orchestra in May: Gershwin's *Rhapsody in Blue*, with guest conductor Joana Carneiro. He is also scheduled to tour the Maritime provinces in February 2013.

Born in Edmonton, Alberta, Todd Yaniw received Performance and Artist Diplomas from The Royal Conservatory's Glenn Gould School, and is currently studying with Dr. Jon Kimura Parker at Rice University in a Master's program. His other major teachers were Michael Massey, Dr. James Parker and James Anagnoson.

Todd Is also an accomplished violist; he received his ARCT performance diploma from the Royal Conservatory and has several years of orchestral playing experience.

- > News from Nick Read in Ottawa. He is a paid member and administrator for the Ottawa Bach Choir, playing in a quartet, coaches chamber ensembles at Carlton and is really enjoying teaching cello.

A member of the award-winning Aviv String Quartet from 2002-2010, Rachel toured regularly on five continents. Currently based in Toronto, Rachel is cellist of Ensemble Made In Canada, Via Salzburg, the Mercer-Park Duo, and is Artistic Director of the "5 at the First" chamber series in Hamilton. Rachel has given masterclasses at schools, conservatories and universities across North America, South Africa and in Israel. Rachel can be heard on the Naxos, Delia Classics and EnT-T record labels.
- > Amy Laing has enjoyed her year as acting Principal Cello with the Victoria Symphony (Brian Yoon takes over in September). She has also flown back and forth to Toronto to keep her commitments, including being an extra with the TSO. Amy will play in the Victoria Symphony summer season. Amy and Martin Bonham did a recent recital of Duo Baroque Sonatas.
- Evan Buttar is still "playing on gut strings and enjoying them". He recently played for Hans Jorgen Jensen and his quartet played for the Simon Bolivar Quartet.
- Michael Unterman in "A Far Cry" had a tour of the southern U.S.A. in March and will be playing at Ravinia in the Chicago area July 1st. Michael and some friends have formed a baroque ensemble called "Gut Reaction". Michael will be doing the Graduate Diploma program at Julliard in September.

British Musicians Want Similar Airline Carry-On Rules - Now that US musicians finally have a consistent policy for carrying instruments on planes, British musicians arc asking their government to step up and standardize their rules as well. The Musicians' Union (MU) says that musicians regularly have problems taking their instruments on planes due to inconsistent policies from airlines, airports, and airline staff, as well as extra fees that can make the difference between making or losing money on a gig. the UK Government to consider introducing a similar act regarding instruments on planes as has just been passed in the USA. Such a policy would make a difference to the fives of musicians, who often face a lottery when they fly with an instrument," says MU General Secretary John Smith.

News from Lee Wasilenko in Nelson, BC



"Lee has been put in touch (through Nadia Hall, cello teacher in Nelson) with Jeff Faragher, a cellist from Edmonton (M.Mus. McGill, MBA U of A) who moved to Nelson with his wife about four years

ago. He plays principal cello with the Symphony of The Kootenays out of Cranbrook. Jeff recently played Dvorak Concerto a few months ago. In his early 30s and full of energy and enthusiasm, he keeps busy with lessons, classes, ensembles and performances. Jeff runs a weekly "orchestra" of violins and cellos. The approx 16 participants range in age from 8-60+. I am one of three cellists, the other two are younger girls and we all have similar playing experience ranging from 2-4 years. You'll be proud to hear that, though nervous, I took control of the cello break out group to lead us in our practice, since the girls were young and shy. I think we did quite well. The music was a good level for me; easy enough that I could sight read it but challenging enough that I am engaged. We played Ave Maria and a piece by Handel. I feel well prepared for it from our lessons; we warmed up






with some easy scales (G major and D major) and I am just about certain I am the only one that knew the notes and fingerings by heart:-) He charges about \$10 for drop-in fees, which I feel is reasonable. Afterwards I bartered for farm fresh eggs and handmade stone-ground fire-baked bread with several of the violinists. There are also a mother (violin) and daughter (cello) from Vienna who I spoke in German with for a bit. Very nice people all. On Thursday's Jeff runs a cello ensemble with 7 cellos in his studio out the lake so I will go to that tonight and see how it is. He charges \$15 per session for the ensemble which also seems reasonable."



Shirley's Seven Steps Towards Healthier Musicianship

1. Warm - up before playing/singing (2 - 5 minutes)
Get the blood flowing throughout the body. Loosely swing arms from shoulders, move elbows, circle wrists, wiggle fingers, gently roll neck, make faces, move back and pelvis, run on the spot, etc.

Stretch after playing/singing (2 - 5 minutes)
 Pay particular attention to muscles and joints that have been kept tight or used in a repetitive way. Hold a stretch in the complete opposite direction for 10 - 30 seconds. You may repeat 2 or 3 times as necessary. Keep In Tune with Your Body

3. Breathe, Relax, and Elongate
Learn proper breathing techniques, relaxation and postural awareness. Incorporate them into playing /singing at all times. There may be a tendency to hold your breath especially during difficult passages or when discomfort starts. Be sure to avoid this! It decreases the oxygen and nutrition circulating throughout the body and feeds into the "Pain/Tension/Pain Cycle".

4. Stay Fit
At least 2 - 3 times a week for at least 30 minutes, take part in some form of exercise, sport or activity that ensures muscles are balanced, strong, and flexible - particularly abdominals (core) and upper back. Your body is then in a better position to support you and allow you to play or sing more efficiently and easily.

5. Practice Visualization

- i) Learn the above exercises well enough so that you can automatically recruit them and periodically visualize them while playing/singing or sitting still for long periods.
- ii) Use visualization to practice pieces (especially when you have pain)

6. Ergonomic Check

Once a month check the ergonomics of yourself with respect to your instrument, seat, music stand, prescription glasses, etc. If you use a computer frequently, ensure that it is also ergonomically sound and not contributing to the problem.

7. Smile More Often
